Opening Statement:

It is my pleasure to welcome you to this evening's Interfaith Talk.

This is the fourth in a series of such events this year which have been organised by the City of Canterbury Interfaith Reference Group.

The Group was established as an initiative of Council's Multicultural Advisory Committee back in February 2013 and it has since benefitted from the active participation of numerous local faith leaders.

The Group meets quarterly as a way of supporting community leaders to maintain close relationships with each other and to regularly exchange ideas and explore issues that they have in common.
